<<Information on taking Basic Training>>

Students are not able to take both "Basic Training I" and "Basic Training II".

<<Information on taking Total Health Planner courses>>

1. Courses indicated by "©" are Total Health Planner courses.
2. Of these, "Introduction to Health Care System", "Research Methods in Health and Medicine", "Advanced Topics on Total Health Planner" and "Seminar on Health Sciences" can be taken by either students seeking internal recognition as a Total Health Planner or students not seeking such recognition.
3. "Practice Theory on Total Health Planner" is only for students seeking internal recognition as a Total Health Planner.
4. Among the Total Health Planner courses, "Research Methods in Health and Medicine" can be substituted for "Nursing Research Methods", which is a Specialized Course.
5. Students seeking to be recognized by the University as a Total Health Planner must earn 10 credits by taking all five Total Health Planner courses as part of the 34 or more total credits required. However, 32 credits is sufficient for such recognition when "Nursing Research Methods" is taken as a substitute for a course that can be taken to earn the required credits.
